Universalist Cemetery Restoration Update

It has been a year since the Barnstable Town Council approved our grant of \$54,100 from Community Preservation funds for Phase I work on the cemetery. I am happy to report that the Preservation Restriction Agreement was recently signed by church officers and town officials and sent on to the Massachusetts Historical Commission for final signatures.

We anticipate that the restriction will be filed with the Registry of Deeds before the end of April, after which we can begin requesting funds from the town.

The installation of fencing by Reliable Fence will be scheduled as soon as possible, and will likely occur during the summer.

Conservator Donna Walcovy will begin in May to prepare a Condition Assessment, which will include identification, mapping, and evaluation of all of the stones in the cemetery. This is an arduous task that is expected to take one year.

When you look out the sanctuary windows this summer, expect to see some positive activity in the cemetery!






Summer Shorts

Mission of the Month For April, May and June

Nathaniel Holmes First Resident Gravestone Carver of Cape

The Universalist Cemetery contains at least 24 stones carved by Nathaniel Holmes, dated 1826 to 1852.

Our restoration project will begin soon to address the deterioration of many of the stones, the majority of which date to the 1800's when Hyannis was a thriving maritime village. Many sea captains and their families are buried here.

Nathaniel Holmes (1783-1869) began his career in Plymouth, and moved to Barnstable around 1805 to become Cape Cod's first resident carver. His house still stands on Route 6A in Barnstable Village, along with an adjacent shed which probably served as Holmes's workshop for the last 40 years of his life. Holmes married Abiah Crocker Davis in 1813, and they had nine children between 1814 and 1835.


"The Cape prospered from the boom in shipping between about 1815 and the Civil War, and Holmes was there to capitalize, serving a populace that could afford to spend more on items such as gravestones." (From Slate to Marble: Gravestone Carving Traditions in Eastern Massachusetts, James Blachowicz, 2015.)

Holmes preferred a light grey slate over marble, even when the trend began moving toward marble stones. His principal decorative motifs were the willow and urn. He also carved cherubs with wings through about 1807 and later flowers, sailing vessels and rosettes. He was known for his border decorations, italicized inscriptions, and a distinctive letter "g".

Holmes carved approximately 1500 gravestones over his 70-year career, the majority in Barnstable and Yarmouth. He is buried in Cobb's Hill Cemetery in Barnstable.

As a result of her 3.90 GPA, she was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. A quote from a reference: "Bella is highly intelligent, creative and multi-talented." We will look forward to seeing Bella's name in the lights on Broadway.

Sam Rosen, son of Cynthia Cole and Isaac Rosen, has just graduated from Barnstable High School. He will be attending Southern Connecticut State in the fall where he will major in physical training and recreation. In addition to having an outstanding football career where he set several records, Sam participated in a senior internship at the Cape Wildlife Center. Sam's three references used words to describe him: kind, a strong leader, wonderful strength of character. Sam's goal is to become a football coach where he intends to provide for kids the same kind of love and nurturing that he received as a young football player. Perhaps some of you may remember watching Sam grow up in this church from the time he portrayed Joseph in a Christmas pageant to later reading the scriptures in front of the congregation.
